


Introduction: Sometimes we make the mistake of thinking that once we have believed, repented, and confessed, our obedience is then culminated in baptism. In fact, this process simply puts us INTO Christ (as we shall see from this lesson) and our obedience has really only just begun. Confession, for instance, is also translated "profession" in some cases and so we should see our whole life as professing the verbal confession we made prior to baptism. Read Rom. 10.9-10 and Titus 1.16 to see the different usages of this word "confess". It should be especially interesting to note that this is a Our whole life becomes a continual process. profession of not only who Jesus is but of His purpose in coming to earth. He becomes our King as well as our Savior!



A WORD ABOUT WORDS:

Many times we err greatly in our Bible study because we define the words using a modern English dictionary (say, Webster's, for instance). The problem is that the Bible was not written in English but in Hebrew, Latin (Septuagint), Aramaic and Koine Greek. If we want to know what the words meant as the writers penned them, we must rely on the language scholars. This word "baptism" is a great example of the difference in language definitions. Look it up in a modern English dictionary and you will see that we use the word quite differently from the New Testament usage. Let's be careful to define Bible words using Bible language.

Confession and Baptism
