


## Lesson 9

## The Unique Word of God

**Introduction:** The Bible is unique. In this lesson we will be looking at the Word of God in a way which should prove faithbuilding. Its continuity and unique harmony attest to its origin, confirming its claim as the Revealed Word from our Creator. There are many more proofs as to the authenticity of this Book of Books and the studies of those proofs is called "Evidences" and "Apologetics". It would serve you well to continue studying this area to help ward off Satan's skeptics. As a brother once told me, "People do not have intellectual problems with Christianity, only moral ones." I have found his

observation to be very accurate. When people try to explain away the authenticity of the Scriptures they are quite often dealing with a troubling passage with which they would rather not comply. Also, G.K. Chesterton once wrote, "Christianity has not been tried and found wanting but rather found difficult and not tried." These statements reveal much about man's attitude toward trying to find the Truth (capital "T") but when genuine, objective criteria is used to evaluate the authenticity of the Word of God, it stands tall among all literature. Let's take a look at its uniqueness.
